My Dear Parishioners,

You are receiving this parish newsletter just before Ash Wednesday (which is also Valentine's Day this year) to prepare you for Easter Sunday (which is also April Fool's Day this year) [!]. As a commentator on NPR said last week, "go figure." I'm sure the atheists will have a field day with this odd pairing: the Catholic day of ashes, penance, and fasting landing on February 14 and the greatest Catholic expression of faith in the Risen Christ landing on April 1. Such is 2018, and we all know that God has an exquisite sense of humor.

We enter into Lent through the portal of Ash Wednesday to prepare, over 40 days, for Easter. We enter this life through the portal of human birth to prepare, over the span of our 70 or 80 years, for heaven. Life is hard at times, and so is Lent, but both only serve a greater end, which is heaven. And heaven is simply being with Jesus Christ, in union with our Heavenly Father and their Holy Spirit.

What is most inspiring about Star's outreach to the less fortunate, mostly homeless, who need a hot meal, is how many different ministries and people in the parish are involved.


For the Saturday before Thanksgiving, the young adults prepared and served a delicious turkey dinner under the direction of Lorna Feria, director of the children's religious education program, We served it with the Missionaries of Charity at St. Anthony of Padua Church off Cesar Chavez. In January, the Filipino Association, FAASTAR, cooked dinner and helped serve it with the Missionaries under the overpass homeless encampment in that same neighborhood.


They are just some of the volunteers who join a cadre of regular monthly volunteers to help prepare and serve a meal to the men and women, many of them homeless, who receive blessings, prayer and hot food six days a week from Mother Teresa's sisters. Star of the Sea is committed to preparing and serving the homeless every third Saturday with the Sisters.

Star of the Sea also sends volunteers to work with our Fraternite Notre Dame"French Sisters." They serve meals at their Mary of Nazareth kitchen as well as at St. Anthony's Dining Room in the city's Tenderloin neighborhood.

The parish does a good job including as many people as possible in this ministry, with barrels at the doors of the church for monthly donations of various toiletries. Jacqueline Paras, outreach coordinator, is also director of the Parish Preschool and her students join with religious education students to decorate lunch bags for the homeless around major holidays including Thanksgiving, Christmas and Easter.

"Serving the homeless helps keep me humble and thankful," Jacqueline said recently.





The word "Lent" comes from the Old English word for "Springtime." Here in San Francisco we don't have much of a spring because we don't have much of a winter, but all of us feel the need once a year to "spring clean" our wintry souls. Lent is that annual taking stock of our relationship with God, neighbor, and self. It provides for this in three areas: Prayer, almsgiving, and penance.

Prayer. How consistent is my relationship with the good God? Am I faithfully attending Mass every Sunday by receiving the Bread of Life at the altar rail? Am I preparing my soul by making a good confession every month or so? Can I commit to one hour a week of silent prayer and reading in our beautiful adoration chapel or church? Am I praying the rosary daily or at least weekly in loving honor of my dear Mother Mary?

Almsgiving. After we've straightened out our relationship with God, we consider our fellow pilgrims on this planet. How can I better express love in my own home and workplace by being more patient, more supportive, more sensitive to those around me? Am I giving of my talents in at least one service project, such as feeding the homeless, participating in a social group, or helping out in my church or local community? Am I supporting my parish and local charities with the financial gifts God has given me?

Penance. And finally, myself. Am I living the necessary disciplines that refines a healthy Christian? Am I getting to bed on time and getting up early? Am I eating or drinking or smoking unhealthily, and how can I fast every week? What TV, movies, Internet, or music should I clean up in my weekly consumption of media? Am I getting regular exercise and putting in a good day's work?

Our parish offers several initiatives to help you reset your life this Lent (see page 7), such as our Friday soup suppers and talks. It's time for some good old Spring Cleaning, with God's help!


